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# PRESIDENT'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2016

The Cranfield Students' Association (CSA) is the umbrella body of Cranfield University students. The main objectives of the Union can be summarised with three key words: Represent, Support, Engage.

The CSA represents students' rights, views and interests; it supports students' life at Cranfield with advice, entertainment, and regular news; it engages and encourages the students to engage with others through clubs and societies, volunteering opportunities, and other activities and as a result develop their leadership and team working potentials.

This is a summary to highlight the extent to which the association has achieved its aims and objectives within the year under review. The report is not exhaustive in this context but focuses mainly on the activities and achievements that show the associations' progress during the year.

#### **ACHIEVEMENTS**

Review of the Students Charter. The Students Charter which highlights the various responsibilities of the University, CSA and Students has been reviewed for the year 2016/2017 together with the Vice Chancellor and has been approved by the University Council.

Representation: The association remains in the fore front of representing the interest of students within and outside the University. Previous achievements are being consolidated upon including provision of wide selection of international foods at the CSA. The On-campus fixed rent contract for continuing research students will continue to be implemented. Efforts have been made to douse tension as a result of the closure of the University Medical Centre. The campus mosque was successfully relocated to a new site.

#### **ACTIVITIES**

During this period, different events and social activities were organised by and with the support of the CSA to increase the engagement, promote social networking, and encourage non-academic skill development in an international environment.

Amongst others the most important events were the Welcome week, Clubs and Societies fair, International Week, Annual General Meeting, the Student Led Teaching Award (SLTA) ceremony, the President's Ball, the Clubs and Societies Award ceremony and Cranfield Olympics. Trips were organised for students to different places in England; notably Cambridge, Oxford, London, and Whipsnade Zoo. Research students' activities are receiving support from the CSA across schools and campuses. The CSA Exec sponsored a competition among researchers on thesis presentation and organised a research students' forum for SATM researchers. CSA Exec Award Night was held for course reps, clubs and societies presidents and volunteers to appreciate their efforts for the year under review.

We have continued to support the clubs and societies in different ways. The men's Handball team won 2016 ABUHC championship trophy while the men's Football team came top of their league.

### STUDENTS OFFICERS

The CSA elections for the positions of Green and Residences Officer, SATM research rep, Media Relation Officer, Content Editor were held in November, while the President, Vice President (Shrivenham), International Officer, Students Trustee, Event Officer, Social Officer (Shrivenham) were held in April.

### APPRECIATION AND CONCLUSION

I would like to acknowledge the commitment and dedication of the CSA executive officers, trustees and Staff to the Association. I also would like to thank the University administration under the leadership of Professor Sir Peter Gregson and the University Executive team for their support and collaboration in providing a favourable environment for the CSA operations.

# REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2016

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 July 2016. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

# **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

Cranfield Students' Association's (CSA) objects are the advancement of education of Students at Cranfield University for the public benefit by

- (i) Promoting the interests and welfare of Students at Cranfield University during their course of study and representing, supporting and advising Students;
- (ii) Being the recognised representative channel between Students and Cranfield University and other external bodies;
- (iii) Providing social, cultural, sporting and recreational activities and forums for discussions and debate for the personal development of its Students.

The CSA fulfils these objects through a wide range of projects and activities based upon the needs and wishes of its members.

# ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

#### Representation and support

Promotion of the interests of students of Cranfield University is an important role of the CSA. During the course of the year, a number of issues were raised on behalf of students, with some notable successes.

A vital part of this progress was the continued improvement in student representation within the University. A new training session was introduced at each campus, involving both University and CSA staff. This led to a wider discussion and the production of a working paper on the recruitment and training of representatives, which will be implemented in 2016.

Once again, student representation on University committees increased. CSA Officer and staff membership of the University Health & Safety Committee was formalised, and it is intended that this drives student representation on School H&S committees.

CSA Officers and staff visited individual schools as part of an outreach programme to engage with members at a local level. A number of issues were raised and taken forward to the University, and at the end of the year feedback supplied to students.

CSA Officers and staff worked closely with the University to address the UK Government's PREVENT legislation. This ensured that the University's obligations were met without significant impact on the activities and freedoms of students and student societies.

For a fifth year, the CSA organised Student Led Teaching Awards (SLTA) to allow students to recognise those members of staff who made outstanding contributions to learning at both campuses, and identify students' ideas as to what constitutes good teaching. The awards were expanded to recognise the contribution made to learning by research supervisors. CSA staff engaged with NUS nationally to develop systems allowing the data collected by SLTA to feed directly into improvements in teaching, both locally and nationally.

On an individual basis, the CSA Officers and/or staff represented students in their appeals or other complaints to the University with the aim of obtaining the best practical outcome for the individual concerned in each case. This work is dependent upon the maintenance of strong and trusting relationships with University staff, whilst continuing to act as an independent body.

Despite being a small University, the CSA continued to help students to have a voice at a national level, whether by students attending NUS events or the organisation as a whole taking part in campaigns and consultation wherever relevant.

### Welfare and campaigns

Closely tied to student representation were a number of campaigns to promote the interests of Cranfield students. There were a number of particular successes during the year.

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

CSA Officers continued to promote support and opportunities for female researchers on campus and in the wider scientific and engineering communities. The Female Research Network (FeRN) arranged events at both campuses.

The CSA continued to work closely with the University to ensure that the residences rent structure is fair for all students. The issue of accommodation for students at Shrivenham campus remains an important issue, and local Officers worked closely with the University to determine student opinion and initiate solutions by working with landlords and advertisers.

Road safety remains a concern for both the CSA and the University. The CSA continues to distribute free hi-viz vests to cyclists and walkers/runners at both campuses, and promotes their use and other safety information at induction seminars.

As ever, numerous small initiatives made improvements to the student experience in response to member needs and requests.

#### Social and recreational activities

As both campuses of Cranfield University are small, and all students are postgraduate and time limited, the role of the CSA in providing social activities is vital.

The numbers of cultural, interest-based and sporting clubs & societies and the numbers of students involved in these groups increased. New groups were established, often with great success, and ongoing groups continued to provide diverse and vibrant opportunities. The Men's Handball team deserves special recognition, becoming national University Champions. A number of clubs also organised tours, both in the UK and abroad.

In addition, one-off events targeted particular groups of students, as well as being of general appeal, to ensure that there was something for everyone over the course of the year and address under engagement. These included a children's Christmas party, firework display, International Week and the Cranfield sports day.

The CSA at Shrivenham ensured that there was a regular and varied programme of social activities for its members. These events remain vital to the social cohesion of a small community.

A number of coach trips were organised from both campuses. These were to a range of educational, cultural and social destinations and were all immensely successful, allowing an expanded programme to be put in place for 2016-17.

The CSA continued to provide a range of opportunities for its members to enhance their personal development. These included organising clubs and societies, managing individual events, providing entertainment by bands and DJs and various media roles, as well as work opportunities in the CSA bar, café and shop and acting as Executive Officers and/or Trustees. The CSA also supported a new event for Research Students that allowed them to present their work to a general audience.

The CSA runs a range of operations to provide services to its membership. The catering operation had a notably successful year; expanding opening times to compensate for the closure of other outlets on campus and the range of outsourced international food options was increased. The bar continued to act as the centre of social activities, and provide a social space for students. The shop was again successful, although changes to the University merchandise requirements posed a challenge during the year.

The CSA continues to support a policy of the provision of services to students, rather than with the intent of making significant profits. However, any surpluses are reinvested into the pursuit of the organisation's objectives; in particular, funds have been set aside to fund improvements to the CSA bar areas.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### Financial position

The CSA's gross income for the year 2015-16 from all sources was £958,674 (2015: £952,742). This included continued support from Cranfield University in the form of grants totalling £186,585 (2015: £204,275). Expenditure totalled £910,137 (2015: £943,266) creating an overall surplus for the year of £48,537 (2015: £9,476). This included depreciation of assets totalling £23,679 (2015: £39,875), suggesting an operating surplus of £72,216 (2015: £49,351).

As a result of the above figures, there was a change in the value of fixed assets to £30,555 (2015: £45,762). Total funds stand at £291,147 (£269,502 unrestricted and £21,645 restricted), compared to £242,610 previously. This presents a good cash flow situation based on strong and appropriate reserves.

The CSA encourages strong and active clubs & societies at Cranfield University. To support these groups, the CSA holds their funds for safekeeping within its own accounts. At present, these funds total £16,381, very similar to the previous year.

The block grant from Cranfield University for 2016-17 has been set at £210,098. In addition, grants have been set for clubs & societies and Shrivenham campus of £15,760 and £10,000 respectively. It is predicted that net commercial income and surplus will remain stable on the year. Therefore, it is the view of the trustees that the CSA has sufficient funds to meet its obligations.

#### Reserves policy

The reserve policy of Cranfield Students Association (CSA) is:

- 1. CSA maintains a financial reserve of unrestricted funds.
- 2. The reserve protects the CSA against unexpected events, either significant changes in income or expenditure required in an emergency to protect the CSA's operations.
- 3. The size of the reserve is reviewed annually by the CSA Trustees at the time of the presentation of the annual accounts. This figure should be approximately two month's turnover.
- 4. The size of the reserve may be varied to allow the CSA to accumulate funds for specified future expenditure.
- 5. It is the intention that the CSA should operate on a zero-budget on an annual basis with no significant surplus or deficit.
- 6. The Trustees may either authorise additional expenditure or require operational savings in any year to maintain the reserve at the required amount.
- 7. This policy is reviewed every three years, or sooner at the Trustees' discretion.

# Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the trustees believe that no material uncertainties exist

#### **FUTURE PLANS**

The CSA will continue to adapt to the requirements of the University's structures to ensure that there is effective and appropriate representation of student views. In particular, this will address student representative attendance on committees and further development and support for the Course Representative system.

Refurbishment of the CSA premises remains a high priority. Whilst challenges remain, it is intended that significant improvements will be made.

Further developments of the social programmes at both campuses will aim to ensure that events and activities are provided to engage with the maximum numbers of students.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Charter and Statutes of Cranfield University establish an Association of Students as a constitutional body of the University. The University has agreed that this shall be known as The Cranfield Students' Association (CSA). The governance of the Association is subject to the Charter, Statutes and Ordinances of the University.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Cranfield Students' Association was approved as an independent charity by the Charity Commission on 23rd September 2011. The CSA's charity number is 1143960.

CSA is a students' union within the meaning of the Education Act 1994, and is devoted to the educational interests and welfare of its Members.

#### CSA seeks to:

- (i) ensure that the diversity of its membership is recognised and that equal access is available to all Members of whatever origin or orientation;
- (ii) pursue its aims and objectives independent of any political party or religious group; and
- (iii) pursue equal opportunities by taking positive action within the law to facilitate participation of groups discriminated against by society.

The Board of Trustees has reasonable authority to manage the affairs of CSA in a professional manner. The Members enjoy the right to elect a proportion of the Trustees and to dismiss all of the Trustees. The Board of Trustees gives the utmost consideration to the views of Members.

Officer and Student Trustees are elected by the student body as described in the CSA bye-laws. External Trustees are recruited by the CSA Appointments Committee and confirmed by students at a General Meeting, as described in the CSA Bye-laws and Constitution. No external body may appoint a Trustee. All Trustees are inducted and trained by a the CSA General Manager supported by documentation provided by the Charity Commission; further training may be provided by the University.

The composition of the Executive Committees remains under review to ensure that they reflect the needs of both the CSA and the student membership. The trend is towards representational positions, rather than role-based Officers.

Training of both Trustees and Officers continues to be developed to reflect their responsibilities. This is an on-going process as the CSA works to ensure that its Trustees and Executive Officers have the greatest possible opportunity to succeed in their roles.

Two of the Officer Trustees are paid as part time Officers of the CSA. The President is a half time sabbatical post, working for the CSA alongside their studies. The Vice President (Shrivenham) is paid for 13 hours per month. Neither is paid for working as Trustees, and all other Trustees give their time voluntarily. These arrangements are in accordance with Charity Commission and NUS guidance on employment of trustees.

Strategic decisions are made by the CSA Trustees, taking into account the views of students expressed through CSA Officers and/or the AGM. Operational decisions are delegated to CSA Staff as appropriate, taking into account the views of students expressed through local Executive Committees of CSA Officers.

Under the Education Act 1994, Cranfield University has a statutory duty to ensure that CSA operates in a fair and democratic manner and is held to proper account for its finances. CSA therefore works alongside Cranfield University in ensuring that the affairs of CSA are properly conducted and that the educational and welfare needs of CSA's Members are met.

CSA is affiliated to the National Union of Students. This affiliation has some impact on operational decisions, including the selection of NUS conference delegates, stocking policy in commercial operations and the selection of promotional partners.

The major risks that could impact the CSA were reviewed by the Trustees and procedures agreed to mitigate these risks in February 2016.

The trustees have delegated the day to day management and take advice from Martin Davey in his role as general manager.

There were no changes made to the managerial staff or structure during the year.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2016

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

### Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charity has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemption in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

### Governance costs

Governance costs comprise all costs involving the public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice. These costs include costs related to statutory audit and legal fees.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life

Improvements to property

- 10% on reducing balance

Fixtures and fittings

- 25% on cost

Fixed assets are capitalised if they can be used for more than 1 year and cost at least £500. They are valued at cost.

#### Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

#### Taxation

The charity is a not for profit organisation and is not subject to Corporation Tax

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

#### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

#### Services donated in kind

Cranfield Students Association receives services from Cranfield University, who supply staff and services.

It is our policy to record these services provided as both income and expenditure, by value of the associated costs

#### Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the trustees believe that no material uncertainties exist

#### **Judgements**

No judgements (apart from those involving estimates) have been made in the process of applying the above accounting policies.
